Hello Fríends,





Our Services

Prevention Program

Prevention assistance is provided (this includes food boxes, clothing, and school supplies so families are not choosing between rent and necessities).

Shelter Program

A safe environment is provided 24-hours a day which includes nutritious meals, clean clothing, hygiene products/supplies, and first-aid care.

Case Management

A masters level social work professional assists clients in meeting self-sufficiency goals for health (physical and mental), employment and housing.

Healthcare Assistance Program

Assist clients in obtaining medical prescriptions, scheduling medical appointments, and completing employment physicals.

Professional Counseling

A licensed professional provides on-going therapy to address mental health and sub-stance abuse issues.

Life Skills Education Program

Teaches practical skills and principles in employment, parenting, budgeting, Rent-Wise, healthy decision making, and child nutrition.

Aftercare Program

For 6 months after leaving, clients can still benefit from case management, therapy and Life Skills programming to ensure long-term success.

Transitional Housing

This program serves those suffering from chronic issues such as homelessness, mental illness, substance abuse, and physical disabilities.

Success Stories

Lenny came to the shelter from Lincoln. He had been out of work for several months. Lenny is a 40 year old male who has severe hearing loss. He wears hearing aides. Lenny was able to effectively utilize many of the resources at Care Corps and several different community resources. Lenny worked with Vocational Rehabilitation Services and was able to get new hearing aides for himself while doing so. Lenny became part of the Rotary Club in Fremont while staying at Care Corps. Lenny applied for many different positions and seemed to be having very little luck for several weeks. He felt he was held back because of the fact that he is hearing impaired. However, Lenny was very persistent and knew how to effectively utilize the community. Lenny recently started a job at a local apartment complex where he is their maintenance person. Along with this job comes an on-sight apartment that he can live in so that he is readily available to the tenants.

Jane

Jane came to Care Corps due to being on drug court. Jane is an elderly woman who had a long history of using drugs and alcohol. She had many things stacked against her and had many obstacles to overcome. Jane had to meet the expectations of both Care Corps and drug court. Jane was at Care Corps for almost four months, but when she moved out, she was prepared and in a very positive place. Jane worked at a local diner, making less than minimum wage. So, financially she had a very tight budget on what type of apartment she could afford. On top of that, drug court has many strict rules about where she could rent an apartment. Often, if she found an apartment that was in her price range, she was unable to live there because drug court was unable approve the location. She ran into this barrier over and over again. Jane saved up a significant amount of money while at Care Corps and patiently waited until just the right opportunity came up for her. Because of all of her progress in drug court and in the shelter, at the end of her stay at Care Corps, Jane was offered her old job back working for housekeeping at a local college. This allowed her to slightly increase her budget and she was able to find an apartment that was perfect for her. Care Corps helped her furnish her apartment. To this day, several months after Jane moved out, she still has money in her savings account here at Care Corps. She knows that it is safe here and that she can get to it if she needs to, but so far she has been making it without dipping into that savings!!



I got acquainted with Care Corps in June, 2008 when my wife Teresa and I moved to Fremont. We thought we were going to be able to move into Gifford Towers but found that the process was not complete. We stayed in a motel until we were no longer financially able. We tried staying with some friends, but because of Teresa's disabilities, it was not possible. Our friends told us about Care Corps, so we went to talk to them and they had room. We stayed about 40 days till Gifford was ready for us to move in. In April of 2009, I got the opportunity to volunteer at Care Corps through a program called Experience Works. I am an ordained minister and have ministered three churches including the Church of God here in Fremont. I have also done prison ministry, but Care Corps was the most rewarding experience of my life. I believe that helping people is the greatest thing anyone can do. While working at Care Corps I was able to better understand the effect homelessness really has on people and that all homeless people are not how most people view the homeless. Many times all a client needs is an encouraging word or just a smile to help them cope with life's ups and downs. The staff at Care Corps are great to work with and really show they are there to help, not just to get a paycheck. "I will miss them all. Thank you Care Corps for caring." Bill
